It was my pleasure to command USS KING during the latter half of this deployment. During that period the ship established an enviable record of performance in every task assigned.

KING participated in both phases of the annual major Sixth Fleet exercise, NATIONAL WEEK, including an open ocean missile firing exercise. In addition KING participated in numerous Anti-Air, Anti-Surface and Anti-Submarine Warfare exercises. Toward the end of the cruise, we received the most comprehensive inspection of our engineering department, the Operational Propulsion Plant Examination. 
